Some parables with seeds (Mark 4.26-34)

Jesus tells two parables about seeds, well really about the Kingdom of god. In the first the seed is scattered on the ground, and whatever the man does it grows. Eventually the crop can be harvested.

The growth is a mystery – which agronomists would probably be able to explain. So is the Kingdom a mystery.

The second is the parable of the mustard seed; which starts as a small seed and grows to be as big as a tree and the birds can perch on it.

Jesus likes parables, "With many similar parables jesus spoke the word to them, as much as they could understand. He did not say anything to them without using a parable. But when he was alone with his disciples, he explained everything."

Nick Baines says that Jesus does not define the Kingdom of God – but uses stories and images – and we can work with that.

Paula Gooder explores the question of which mustard seed – and has identified a plant which will grow to the right dimensions – but may be invasive. Which might suggest the kingdom of God is difficult to get rid of, it stays.
